# What is Nazarene Missions International?

Nazarene Missions International (NMI) is the organization for mobilizing the local church in missions in the Church of the Nazarene and the denomination's representative for missions on the district and in the local church.

Since 1915, NMI has served Christ and his mission through the Church of the Nazarene in making Christlike disciples in the nations. NMI supports those called to go and serve as Nazarene missionaries, and NMI provides a place of service for those called to stay and support missions through their local church.

# **NMI** Purpose

NMI is the global missions advocate in every local church. The purpose of NMI is to mobilize the Church of the Nazarene in missions through praying, giving, educating, and engaging children and youth.



NMI is focused on the multicultural and multigenerational strategic objectives of being united in vision and moving forward in action, for the purpose of making an impact on the world for Jesus.

Nazarene Missions International:

- Helps produce missionaries.
- Assists in sending missionaries to the field.
- Supports missionaries on the field.
- Educates individuals and congregations as to the missionaries' work on the field.
- Welcomes and hosts missionaries when they return for home assignment.
- Helps equip missionaries to return to the field.
- Prays for missionaries at home and abroad.
- Helps provide for retirement needs.

We are all needed to further our missions work in the world!

# **NMI** Logo

Prayer, WEF, Alabaster, and Engaging Children and Youth are represented in our logo by the four different-colored sections meeting together in a circle. Connecting churches and missionaries through Links is represented by the lines coming together. unifying our focus as we are united in our vision.



The full circle reminds us we are a global (international) organization with actions and impact affecting the entire world. The intersecting lines form a cross at the center because the message of the Cross is the main focus of NMI as we tell the story.


# **NMI Five Areas of Impact**

NMI focuses on five strategic areas where the local church can have maximum impact on missions in the Church of the Nazarene.

- 1. NMI gathers believers together for *Prayer* in the local church, linking us to our brothers and sisters in Christ around the globe.
- 2. The **World Evangelism Fund** fuels the Church of the Nazarene's mission by combining gifts from each person and church to fund ministries everywhere.
- 3. Through the *Alabaster Offering*, ministries around the world receive funds to purchase property and buildings.
- 4. We want to **Engage Children and Youth** through education and fostering calls to missions.
- 5. *Care & Connection* strategically connects Nazarene missionaries and Nazarene churches through prayer, personal contact, and generous giving.

The Five Areas of Impact were created for local presidents to better focus each year on the five priorities of NMI. Once a church has participated in these five areas and reported it on their end of year report, the local church will be acknowledged as a **Missions Priority One** church! This award demonstrates a more comprehensive commitment to missions than just the World Evangelism Fund.

Focusing on these five areas is the first step your church can take toward deeper involvement in missions. Every church is encouraged to participate in these five areas, and then supplement them with your own congregation's additional areas of interest for missions. By making missions a priority, we demonstrate God's passion for all people.



# WAPAC NMI Goals for 2025

As we all work on behalf of Nazarene Missions International, here are the seven goals for the WAPAC District in 2025. All of these goals are achievable! Information on the following pages will help you lead this work in your church.

# Goals Related to the NMI Five Areas of Impact

- 1. Every church on WAPAC will join in praying for missions! We are to pray for those who have not yet heard about Jesus. We are to pray for people to share the good news. We are to pray for people who are working for the Lord—for their ministry, their needs, their families and more. We are to pray for the strengthening of believers. We can and should all do this. Please join us this year in praying for missions.
- 2. Every church on WAPAC will give to the World Evangelism Fund! Join us this year in upholding our commitments (approved at District Assembly!) to support the World Evangelism Fund, which funds so much of the heartbeat of the Church of the Nazarene.
- 3. Have 78% of our churches on WAPAC receive an Alabaster Offering (an increase of 10% from 2024)! Through the Alabaster offering, ministries around the world receive funds to purchase property and buildings. Receiving an offering for people to support Alabaster gives people an opportunity to contribute to these physical property needs. Alabaster funds are even used in the United States. For example, following natural disasters like hurricanes and floods, Alabaster funds help churches rebuild. Will you present an Alabaster giving opportunity in your church?
- 4. Every church on WAPAC will engage children and youth in missions! We do this to educate and nurture our young people as they seek to respond to God's call. Not everyone is called to local missions, just as not everyone is called to global missions. In Mark 16, Jesus commands that we "Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation." Let us continue sharing this with generations to come, so that all may hear and respond as God places a call on their lives.
- 5. Have participation from 91% of our churches (an increase of 10%) in caring for and connecting with our missionaries! Connect with our Links missionaries or invite missionaries who are on home assignment to come speak at your church! Bring people together in support of God's work in the world, learn what's happening, and help us support and encourage our missionaries.

### Additional Goals

- 1. Each church give \$300 to the District Project in the Philippines! Financial support for this project counts toward your church's 10% missions giving.
- 2. For our 2025-2027 Children's Project, raise \$14,000 in funds (over two years) to support Shechem Children's Home through renovations to the kitchen, new paint, and new appliances, new bedroom furniture for the children, weighted blankets, sensory room equipment, and play equipment.

# What is My Role as Local NMI President?

# **Engaging Your Church in Missions**

As the NMI President in your local church, you are a member of your local church board who actively participates in the efforts of your local church to ensure the mission of God to "Go and make disciples of all nations" is lived out. Your role is to direct and facilitate the work of NMI in your church in cooperation with the pastor, church board and local NMI council to ensure that every person in your church has a deep passion to share Jesus with others in our communities and around the world. You, along with the NMI Council in your church, are focused on supporting our NMI five areas of emphasis (Prayer, Alabaster, World Evangelism Fund, Engaging Children & Youth, Care & Connection). These are areas in which every church can participate, regardless of size, location or language.

You serve an important role, including:

- Encouraging people to pray for all efforts of world evangelism
- Informing people of the world's needs and what we are doing to meet those needs
- Challenging children and youth to actively learn about the mission of the Church
- Raising funds for the mission's outreach
- Nurturing a spirit of missions and mobilizing people into action



### Form an NMI Council in Your Church

The local church should have an NMI Council. Why would this be? A couple of reasons. First, no one should carry all the work themselves; we help others become engaged in the work of missions by taking an active role. Second, this provides opportunity for people of all ages to participate by brainstorming, planning, and bringing to fruition the work of NMI. When one person carries the load, people often don't engage because everything is "handled."

My church is small; what do I do? First, remember that all members of the Church of the Nazarene are members of Nazarene Missions International. The NMI Council is outlined more in the NMI Constitution (https://tinyurl.com/NMI-Constitution, starting on page 343). It could include a president and the number of officers and/or council members as agreed upon by the NMI president and the lead pastor, according to the needs and size of the church. If you have three people in your church, and you are the president, one of the others could take on an area of leading missions prayer, for example, or connecting with our Links missionaries.

What can you do this month? With the new church year barely underway, consider the NMI priorities for the year ahead, considering the 5 areas of impact for NMI (prayer, World Evangelism Fund, Alabaster, Care & Connection with missionaries, and engaging children and youth). Bring people together as you lead this work in your church. Delegate some tasks (or, if you're not quite ready to let go of all the duties, let people shadow and learn from you). Encourage those serving alongside you.

# Attend the District Assembly Missions Gathering

At District Assembly each year, we will have a break-out session for NMI. Outgoing and incoming local NMI presidents, along with any pastors from your church, are invited to attend. This is an important meeting for learning about current missions work and how your church can participate. We also provide missions resources.

# Facilitating a Call to Missions

# Complete NMI Reports for Your Church

Please complete the **Local NMI President Report** on the WAPAC website for your church in alignment with the reporting deadline set by the District each year. This generally should be by mid-March (latest!) so that all reports can be finalized before District Assembly.

Your Pastor may have to enter the information for you on the District website, but the information you will need to report on includes:

- Number of NMI Members (all Church of the Nazarene members in your church!)
- Number of NMI associate members (those who engage with NMI, but aren't church members)
- Questions related to NMI's Areas of Impact:
  - Did your church PRAY for needs around the world as well as missionaries?
  - 2. Did your church give to Alabaster?
  - 3. Did your church pray for and connect with Nazarene missionaries this year?
  - 4. Did your church engage children and youth in missions? (If your congregation is without children or youth, would you have engaged them?)
  - 5. Did your church meet or exceed its World Evangelism Fund allocation?
    - WEF allocation amount: • Amount actually given to WEF:

Only if you answered "yes" to all 5 of the preceding questions, you may answer in the affirmative that you are a Mission Priority One Church (all goals met!).

- Is there an adult, youth, or child from your church considering a call to missions service?
- Did your church give at least 5.7 percent of its income to World Evangelism Fund? If so, you are considered a "World Evangelism Church of Excellence."

# **Area of Emphasis: Prayer**

Our NMI first area of emphasis is Prayer. NMI gathers believers together for prayer in the local church, linking us to our brothers and sisters in the Christ across the globe. Many times people feel that they have nothing to offer missions. The reality is that every believer can contribute to missions in a significant way through prayer. James 5:16 tells us that the "The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective." God is listening!



- We are to pray for those who have not yet heard about Jesus. "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for everyone... This is right and acceptable before God our Savior, who desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth." (1 Timothy 2:1,3-4)
- We are to pray for people to share the good news. "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest" (Matthew 9:37-38).
- We are to pray for people who are working for the Lord, asking for their protection. "No weapon that is fashioned against you shall prosper, and you shall confute every tongue that rises against you in judgment. This is the heritage of the servants of the Lord and their vindication from me, says the Lord" (Isaiah 54:17). - We are to pray for the strengthening of believers. "To this end we always pray for you, asking that our God will make you worthy of his call and will fulfill by his power every good resolve and work of faith, 12 so that the name of our Lord Jesus may be glorified in you and you in him, according to the grace of our God and the Lord Jesus Christ" (2 Thessalonians 1:11).

#### **Specific Prayers for Missionaries**

- Pray for boldness in sharing the Gospel, new ministries, and times when fear may come.
- Pray for the people they are ministering to that their hearts would be open.
- Pray for their education, as many are learning new languages, customs of the place they are serving, and building sustainability.
- Pray for their families, both immediate family and those they are far away from.
- Pray for their personal needs, physical and mental strength, strong relationships, time with family, effective use of time, and opportunities to relax.
- Pray for the virtues of perseverance, strength, wisdom, and peace.
- Pray for their protection.
- Pray for intimacy with Jesus.

#### **How Can Your Church Participate In Prayer?**

Remember our missionaries (Links and otherwise) throughout the year in prayer. Many are often facing troubled times in the places in which they serve. They seek to be peacemakers and agents of transformation. They need your support through intercession. Another idea is to use the weekly NMI resource that is emailed out on Wednesdays. Each week, NMI Central features a different country, region or theme. This resource also includes prayer requests. It is a great touch point for your church and another way to bring the church together



#### **Ideas for Praying for Missions:**

- Post missions-related prayer requests on the fridge, by the stove or on a bathroom mirror to draw them to mind regularly.
- Draw an outline of a hand on a notebook and write missions-related prayer requests for each day.
- Pray with a Sunday School class or small group for specific mission requests.
- Ask your pastor to include a weekly missions-focused prayer request in the bulletin.
- One Sunday a month, take a few minutes during the worship service to pray for your LINKS families. This will help the full church learn their names and be aware of their prayer needs.

# Global Week of Prayer

From the beginning, Nazarene Missions International (NMI) has been praying for the work of the global church. As a global denomination that ministers in 165 world areas, we strive to be connected and lift each other up in prayer.

This desire is not unique to the Church of the Nazarene. A heart for missions and the work of God's kingdom here on earth has always been the heartbeat of the church. Beginning in 1887, there was a call to prayer for missions that bloomed into the World Day of Prayer. This movement is global and stretches across denominations. The World Day of Prayer falls on the first Friday of March every year.

In 1996, Nazarene Missions International joined this movement by observing a week of prayer focused on joining together as Nazarenes all around the world to lift up our brothers and sisters

in prayer. We are also joining with our brothers and sisters outside of the Church of the Nazarene by observing our week of prayer the same week as the World Day of Prayer. In 2026, the Global Week of Prayer is March 1-7.

Thank you for participating in and encouraging your church to join in the Global Week of Prayer! May this week be a sacred time as we serve as the global missions advocate in every local church, nurturing a spirit of missions and mobilizing into action, impacting people around the world.

# **Area of Emphasis: World Evangelism Fund**

The World Evangelism Fund (WEF) fuels the Church of the Nazarene's mission by combining gifts from each person and church to fund ministries everywhere. Every church is asked to give a portion of their yearly tithes/offerings for the purpose of making Christlike disciples in the nations.

Giving our 'tithe' means giving the first 10% of our income. When we give 10%, we aren't just giving to God, we are acknowledging that everything we have is God's to begin with: it's from Him. Churches also demonstrate this by "tithing" on their tithe. In the Church of the Nazarene, we use this to support world evangelism.

# What Your Giving Through WEF Accomplishes

WEF is how we fuel our global mission in the Church of the Nazarene. First and foremost, it funds our missionaries around the world. Many missionaries also receive medical insurance, a pension plan and other valuable benefits. But that is the tip of the iceberg!

Your giving through WEF provides resources and literature in over 90 languages to churches all over the world, including resources for pastors and Bible-based teaching materials for children, youth and adults. Your giving funds clergy development and ordination, making holiness education available worldwide through Nazarene institutions of higher education.

Through your giving, new congregations worldwide are able to positively impact their communities. Pastors and leaders are trained and equipped to serve in these churches. Further, the Church of the Nazarene develops and sustains worldwide communication, technology support and mission endeavors so that the unreached may hear the gospel. In addition, Nazarene Missions International (NMI), Nazarene Youth International (NYI), Nazarene Missions Teams and similar ministries are supported by WEF.

Sometimes it can be hard to trust God when we give. But God is faithful, and we trust he will steward these funds better than we will. Join us this year in upholding our commitments to support the World Evangelism Fund, which funds so much of the heartbeat of the Church of the Nazarene.

### My Church's WEF Allotment

All Nazarene churches are expected to contribute 5.5% of total tithes received to the World Evangelism Fund, which is more than halfway to that 10% for world missions goal.

#### **Example:**

A church receives \$100,000 in tithes each year. It's WEF allotment is \$5,500.

When your church gives, the money goes to the General Treasurer's Office where the funds are distributed to various regions, missionaries, and ministries around the globe. The World Evangelism Fund not only provides ministries on the ground with the monies they need, but the money is used to ensure that legal, federal, and support needs are met so that ministries are as safe as possible and can be sustained for years to come.

A few examples of where funds are utilized:

- WEF supports more than 600 missionaries and key national works as they work in more than 160 world areas / countries.
- It provides financial help to more than 300 district organizations supporting more than 30,000 churches.
- It finances Gospel literature production in almost 100 languages.
- It is a lifeline for 43 Bible colleges and seminaries with almost 10,000 students, and for 3 vocational and training colleges with more than 200 students.
- It makes possible elementary and secondary schools serving almost 60,000 children.
- It supports more than 60 medical clinics and 2 Nazarene hospitals.
- WEF supports pensions for nearly 300 retired missionaries.

The easiest way for your church to pay its WEF allotment in full is to contribute monthly or quarterly based on the tithes and offerings your own church brings in.

# Ten Percent Approved Specials

If we are following the model of tithing, each church would give 10% of its received tithes as a world missions goal. WEF giving is 5.5% of that goal. Churches can give to other world mission approved specials throughout the year to reach that 10%.

Ten Percent giving is an endorsement of particular ministries and projects in our global church. These ministries and projects called Approved Nazarene Mission Projects provide an opportunity for churches and individuals to support specific ministries while providing a form of recognition for their ministry support. Recognition is recorded when the funds are reconciled in Global Treasury Services.

For example, all missionaries, whether sent on a global or sponsored deployment, benefit from World Evangelism giving. However, they are also responsible for raising a portion of their own support, which we call **deputation**. When you give to a missionary's deputation fund, they use it for things like travel expenses, purchasing a vehicle, ministry expenses, and educational needs for their children, among other specifically defined uses. This deputation given is not a part of a church's WEF giving, but does count as an approved special.

Other approved specials include our WAPAC Children's Project, Alabaster offerings, Nazarene Compassionate Ministries, and Jesus Film Harvest Partners, registered Nazarene Missions Team projects, registered Compassionate Ministry Centers, and World Mission Broadcast, among others. You can search for projects to determine if they are approved specials here: https://give.nazarene.org/category/global-missions-projects

Giving toward approved specials reduces a church's tithe income. For example:

If a church has offerings totaling \$100,000 in a year, their WEF allotment is 5.5% (\$5,500 of that \$100,000).

If that church gives to \$1,000 for missionary deputation, \$750 for Alabaster, and \$703 for the WAPAC Children's Project, the total of approved specials is \$2,453. These reduce the church's "income" through tithes to \$97,547. So the WEF allotment is 5.5% of that new "income" amount (or \$5,365.09).

If you are unsure about the status of a ministry, please call 800-544-8413 to find out more.

### Church of Excellence

If your church gives over 5.7% of its tithe (or an additional \$1500, whichever is less) to the World Evangelism Fund, your church is designated a Church of Excellence. WEF giving beyond 5.5% is invested in new world areas and new works in the USA and Canada.

### Faith Promise

The Church of the Nazarene acknowledges that Faith Promise giving is a biblical method used by many local churches for raising financial support for world evangelism. The main priority is reaching the world for Christ through the payment of a church's allotment for the World Evangelism Fund.

A Faith Promise is a FAITH commitment between a person and God to give above and beyond their tithe to the local church to support missions. Through Faith Promise, people are promising to give to God's mission around the world whatever he lays on their heart to give.



If Faith Promise funds are to be used for other missions projects (e.g., local projects, Alabaster, Nazarene Missions Team, Jesus Film, etc.) in addition to WEF, it must be clearly stated for your congregation how much will go to WEF and where the other funds go. Transparency is important!


Faith Promise is NOT to be confused with:

- Tithe: A Faith Promise offering is a love gift to God, given beyond one's tithe.
- A Substitute for Missions Offerings: In addition to Faith Promise, opportunities should be given for people to give to missions. Such offerings allow those not participating in Faith Promise to give to missions. For those who are giving to Faith Promise, it provides additional opportunity to give as the Holy Spirit leads. Additional missions offerings include (but are not limited to) Alabaster, Jesus Film Harvest Partners, World Mission Broadcast, Nazarene Compassionate Missions, deputation and so forth.

#### **Planning a Faith Promise Event**

To help people think through their own Faith Promise beyond their regular tithes and offerings, it is strongly encouraged that you hold an event (generally right before the start of your church's fiscal year).

Bring in an inspirational missions speaker (it doesn't have to be for the Sunday morning service!). Share the need to support Nazarene world missions efforts, and identify that supporting missions is an offering of thanks to God and a commitment to participate in his kingdom work in the world. Encourage people to complete Faith Promise response/pledge cards (they keep the portion with their name!).

# **Area of Emphasis: Alabaster**

Churches lay the foundation through Alabaster offerings for places where people worship, heal, and learn by encouraging global participation each year. Every Alabaster project is a joint effort of local contribution and labor, combined with global love and support in bringing tangible presence and a sense of long-term commitment to a community. No Alabaster funds are used for administrative costs.



Through the Alabaster offering, ministries around the world receive funds to purchase property and buildings around the world (including in the United States).

- Purchase a property or convert property into a church gathering space
- Purchase or build a church building or parsonage
- Meet initial costs for renting a church meeting space for a limited period of time
- Purchase or build regional or field missions facilities (e.g., hospitals or schools)
- Build or repurpose buildings on Bible college campuses

Churches are encouraged to plan to receive an Alabaster offering when it is most convenient for the church calendar. These offerings are **over and beyond WEF**. When a local church gives these offerings through the appropriate channels, the church will receive credit for 10% given.

#### How did this offering come about?

Following the end of World War II, in the late 1940s, the Church of the Nazarene was experiencing a need for more missions funding. At a meeting of the Global NMI Council, Elizabeth Vennum was asked to find a way to raise funds for land purchases and building construction needs around the world.

As she rode the train home from that council meeting, she said the Lord gave her the details for the Alabaster Offering. The offering was based on the story of the woman pouring perfume on Jesus from a container carved from soft alabaster stone (Luke 7:37-38). Building on that biblical story, Nazarenes were asked to put off buying new perfume for themselves or postpone purchasing something for themselves and to give that money in the Alabaster Offering instead.

In much the same way that the woman gave her bottle of perfume to Jesus, we have been called to pour out a lavish offering for others. Alabaster was first promoted using this phrase: "Give up a want to meet a need." Alabaster, an offering that for more than 75 years has been a hallmark of Nazarene generosity and sacrifice, is still achieving great things, laying foundations where people worship, heal, and learn.

#### Did you know:

- Nazarenes gave US \$2.8 million for Alabaster to fund projects in 2024. The Alabaster Offering is used in all six global regions.
- Often, Alabaster giving goes hand in hand with Nazarene Missions Teams who help build structures funded by Alabaster and the contributions of Nazarene Missions Teams. NMI assisted 355 Nazarene Missions Teams, comprised of 4,664 participants for projects.

# **Area of Emphasis: Children & Youth**

We intentionally work to engage children and youth through education and fostering calls to missions. NMI encourages every church, every district to be encourage and engage every child and every youth in the mission of God in your community and around the world.





We do this to educate and nurture our young people as they seek to respond to God's call. Not everyone is called to local missions, just as not everyone is called to global missions. In Mark 16. Jesus commands that we "Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation." Let us continue sharing this with generations to come, so that all may hear and respond as God places a call on their lives.

It's easy to think that the generations coming after us see our work and are inspired by it. While that is true, we also need to talk about missions, share why we engage in missions, and encourage our younger people to consider how God is uniquely equipping them for and calling them to his work in the world. This reflects what we see in Deuteronomy 6:6-8 about diligently teaching our children and speaking to them as we walk through life together.

Five ways you can involve youth and children in missions in your church:

- 1. Involve them in acts of service: community meals, VBS programs, compassionate ministries projects. The mission of God has always been based on loving God and loving people; any act that shows love to people and God should be one we engage our young people in.
- 2. Engage them in a local work-andwitness or cross-cultural mission trip. As they express additional calls to missions, help them explore what that means.
- 3. Guide them on the importance of global evangelism prayer. Find specific ways to involve them in praying for different countries and needs around the world.





5. Open God's word. Show what he says in scripture about our mission to "Go!" Share about the missionary journeys recorded in the Bible. Being missions-minded has always been part of God's plan for us.

NMI continues to encourage churches to involve children and youth in all missions endeavors and to nurture them as they seek to respond to God's call. We encourage collaboration with Nazarene Youth International (<a href="https://nazarene.org/who-we-">https://nazarene.org/who-we-</a> are/organization/ministries/nazarene-youth-international) and Nazarene Discipleship

International (https://nazarene.org/ndi) to best engage all ages of the church. We believe

nurturing and leadership development is best done in the local church and individualized to the needs of each person.

# Children's Project - Shechem Children's Home

Our two-year Children's project seeks to raise \$14,000 in funds to support Shechem Children's Home through renovations to the kitchen, new paint, and new appliances, new bedroom furniture for the children, weighted blankets, sensory room equipment, and play equipment.

Shechem Children's Home is a safe house and assessment facility for the children survivors of online sexual exploitation and abuse, a horrendous form of exploitation that is emerging worldwide and finds its epicenter in the Philippines. The name Shechem is derived from the Hebrew word meaning "shoulder." The home wants to be that shoulder or refuge to these children. #### How You (in NMI) Can Help!

Connect with your children's leaders to find ways to engage kids in raising these funds. Kids don't need to know the gory details of what this home is, but they can understand the need to help other kids. Work with your kids programs, such as VBS or Sunday School, to encourage a children's offering. Have contests between classrooms to see which group can raise the most funds. Challenge another church in your Zone. There are so many ways to make this fun and engaging.

### Kids Kaleidoscope Curriculum

One way to engage with kids about missions is to use a monthly resource, called Kids Kaleidoscope. It is distributed through NMI Central the first Wednesday of each month.

This resource is created for kids ages 7-12. It includes a teacher's resource and kids activity page. The materials either reference a story included in NMI Central, or link to something on the web. It has information, activities, recipes, crafts, games and more to help you provide missions learning based on your needs and context. Use what you want from the resources provided.

For example, last June, the focus was on the Global Week of Prayer. There were directions to download a booklet that a leader could use to talk about the Global Week of Prayer. Then, the kids activity page featured questions related to the content, along with

### What is a Nazarene Missionary?

A Nazarene missionary is a Christlike disciple set apart by the Holy Spirit, prayerfully sent out by the church, and affirmed by Nazarene Missions to cross cultural barriers for the purpose of spreading scriptural holiness.

In our local churches, our NMI leaders and pastors are called to actively nurture a spirit of missions and mobilize people to action. As you learn of people (of any age!) who are feeling a call to missions or some prompting on their heart related to missions, you can help encourage them and provide them with resources. View the assortment of resources you can provide to people: https://nazarene.org/send-me.

Resources are available in English, Spanish, Portuguese, Korean and French. They include videos that share stories of those who have been called to missions, guides to pray through such a call, information to help people take the first steps and consider potential missionary opportunities, and much more.

Maybe you haven't heard from anyone about a call to missions. However, you can create a spark through regularly providing opportunities for people to explore on their own if they're feeling such a call.

# **Area of Emphasis: Care & Connection – Supporting Our Missionaries**

As one area of emphasis for NMI, we seek to strategically connect Nazarene missionaries and Nazarene churches through prayer, personal contact, and generous giving.

# Deputation (Missionary Speakers)

We are continually connecting with missionaries and working on their deputation visits to WAPAC. This is a great opportunity to connect with God's work beyond our community.

What is deputation? The Church of the Nazarene funds its mission's enterprise, and supports missionary families, through the World Evangelism Fund (WEF), which is given by local churches around the world throughout the year. Missionaries supplement the WEF by traveling to their home country every few years (deputation) to raise money for specific ministry needs and projects, as well as to share with churches what God is doing around the world and inspire greater involvement with God through missions. The money they raise through deputation offerings is used for a variety of personal needs including medical expenses, vehicles and equipment for field ministry, educational benefits for the missionaries and their children, home furnishing, special mission projects, and more.

Remember that it is not essential to host missionaries on a Sunday or to be a large church to make their visit worthwhile! Many churches have successfully held lunchtime events, evening neighborhood barbecues and joint events with nearby churches. Missionaries appreciate opportunities to connect with small groups of interested people who want to learn more about what is happening through their field assignment. Missionaries are not concerned about the amount of the Deputation offering that might be given or the number of people in attendance they are more interested in making personal people connections and sharing their story. What matters most is doing something instead of doing nothing.

#### **Guidance for Hosting a Missionary**

- **Pray!** Ask God to prepare you and your group for sharing in your missionary's ministry through prayer, giving and creating relationships with them and their families. Look for opportunities to become involved in their lives and offer support.
- **Advertise to your group.** If not provided, ask the Deputation Coordinator for biographical information and/or a picture for promoting the missionary's visit. Be sure that if the missionary is serving in a secure area that you check with them on how to promote their visit to your church. You may want to do some research about the country where the missionary family is serving for more information to share with your people. Your missionary may be able to provide information and photo. It's also helpful to check their Facebook account!

- **Housing.** You may need to provide housing the night (or night before) that the missionary speaks to your group. This can be in family's home, if available.
- **Meals.** Please provide necessary meals. Check with your missionary for food restrictions for all family members so they can be accommodated. Also be mindful that extended deputation visits can be hard on people trying to be healthy in their eating habits. Find healthy ways to support your missionaries.
- **Coordinate with your missionary.** Share about the technology available at your church (including type of computer and software like PowerPoint). Plan to give the missionary access to the sound/video technicians at least 30 minutes before the service.
- **Take an offering.** The offering should be sent to the Global Ministry Center in care of the missionary's deputation account. Mail to: Attn. Donor Services, Church of the Nazarene, 17001 Prairie Star Parkway, Lenexa, KS 66220. Funds should be clearly marked with the missionary's full first and last names.

**Did you know:** Deputation funds should not be given directly to the missionaries. Rather, they should be provided to Attn. Donor Services, Church of the Nazarene, 17001 Prairie Star Parkway, Lenexa, KS 66220. Funds should be clearly marked with the missionary's full first and last names and "deputation account." (You also can submit online at https://www.nazarene.org/funding-the-mission)

If the church gives the missionary \$600 or more and it does not go through their deputation account, a 1099 form must be given to the missionary. This includes for funds people call "a love" offering.


# Types of Missionaries

What is the difference between a Global Missionary and a Sponsored Missionary?

A **Global Missionary** is primarily funded by the global efforts of World Evangelism and called to serve up to a full career in the field. Affirmed by the Church of the Nazarene, Global Missionaries have prior ministry experience and still strategically serve in a global assignment wherever they are needed in the world.

A **Sponsored Missionary** is primarily funded by their local church community and called to serve a localized need in the field. Affirmed by the local church, district and Church of the Nazarene, they will serve a maximum of four years in the field and have no previous ministry experience.

Both types of missionaries are important to furthering God's work in our world. Are you or someone you know feeling a call to missions? Check out our opportunities around the world: https://opportunities.nazarene.org



#### LINKS Missionaries

Each district is assigned district LINKS missionaries for a year (January through December).

A LINKS relationship cultivates a sense of involvement with Nazarene Missions through regular correspondence to and from missionaries, updates from their field of service, and presentations by LINKS missionaries when they are on home assignment. Your prayers, letters, gifts, and connection to our district-assigned missionaries will make a huge difference in encouraging them and the people they are reaching in the mission field!

Make sure connections go both ways. In addition to learning as much as possible about the missionaries and the fields they serve on, introduce them to your church. Share about your church, share prayer requests, and help the missionary feel connected to your local mission. Schedule video chats on occasion. Invite them to participate by video in your church's events.

The main focus of LINKS is **praying** for our assigned missionary: health, safety, work, connections with others, finances and so on.



Please note that monetary gifts for missionaries are processed through their deputation accounts (linked below).

To ensure the safety and privacy of missionaries, missionary address and phone information will not be shared by NMI or Global Missions. If you need this information for a missionary, please contact either your District NMI president or your District Links Coordinator.

# Missionary Medical Plan

Missionaries often live in areas with higher health risks than in their homeland. Getting adequate health care in a global setting can also be a challenge. Even when proper care is available, the cost may be exorbitant. In some world areas, missionaries incur high travel costs to get to where they can receive needed medical attention. The Missionary Medical Plan helps provide for active and retired Nazarene missionaries and their families when medical needs and emergencies arise.



The Nazarene Missionary Medical Plan pays for insurance that typically covers diagnosis of physical conditions and diseases, dental/vision/auditory health care, evacuation by air and ground ambulance when needed, physical exams for Nazarene missionary families, treatment of childhood diseases and injuries for missionary kids, hospitalization, emergency care, prescription medications, surgical procedures, maternity care and mental health services.

There are several ways churches can support the Missionary Medical Plan.

- **Distinguished Service Award (DSA)**. This is an award churches give in honor of people in their church who are living for a particular area of service (e.g., Sunday School worker, usher, staff member). Although the DSA is given through NMI, it doesn't have to be given in the service area of missions. These awards are presented by a church or a department of the church; individuals may not give this award. The cost of the DSA is \$125, and the funds go to the Missionary Medical Plan. - Memorial Roll. This is presented by a local church, group or individual in memory of a
  deceased family member or friend. A certificate is issued in the name of the person
  memorialized and is often presented to a family member or displayed in the church. The
  cost is \$75, and the funds go to the Missionary Medical Plan. Learn more:

- **Freewill Offerings.** Your church can pick a month or week to focus on gifts to support the Missionary Medical Plan. All money given to the medical plan is used directly for Nazarene missionaries' health care and may count as 10% giving for your church. None of the money is used for administrative costs.

The Missionary Medical Plan provides comprehensive coverage to both active and retired Nazarene missionaries.

# WAPAC NMI Grants for Your Church

Through District NMI funds, we are pleased to offer three grants to support people and projects on WAPAC in alignment with our five focus areas.

- 1. Together Across Generations (TAG) Grant: This is a grant for young adults (ages 18-28) to join a Nazarene Missions Team trip. Applicants must have been members of a WAPAC church for at least 1 year prior to applying.
- 2. Groups Going Glocally (G3) Missions **Grant:** This grant helps provide encouragement and financial support for a youth ministry group to directly participate in local, national, or global missions and compassionate projects. Maximum grant amount is not to exceed 25% of the overall mission project experience or at the discretion of the WAPAC NMI Council. Monies can be used for transportation, supplies, food: anything that would lower the overall cost of the mission experience encouraging more youth to participate.
- 3. **Intentional Connecting Grant:** This is a grant to help local WAPAC Nazarene Churches reach into their neighborhoods and communities. The funds are meant to start, equip, expand, or enhance local ministries as they engage their neighborhoods and communities in Western Washington.

We will be renovating and updating their Hospitality Center, which receives guests and short-term mission participants. The project cost is anticipated to be approximately \$20,000. While participants in the renovation project are paying for their own trip expenses, the project itself is a WAPAC project and needs financial support. - 4. Enter the amount of funds you've submitted to the District Office in order to get 10% Missions Giving credit.

#### Nazarene Missions Teams

You know it as "Work & Witness." But to mark 50 years of missions work and better showcase the wider involvement of Nazarenes in projects around the world, this vital ministry is now known as "Nazarene Missions Teams!"

Nazarene Missions Teams captures all types of projects in which teams can participate, such as Work & Witness, emergency response, evangelism, medical missions, sports, education, compassion, and technology projects. Nazarene Missions Teams is a beautiful way to continue the legacy of the last 50 years and move into a space where more people can use their gifts and talents to serve people and places, joining the Lord and others in fulfilling his mission.



"One of the reasons we changed our name from Work & Witness to Nazarene Missions Teams is that that name implied for many that the team that went were the ones doing the work and they were also the ones doing the witnessing. In reality, the teams going are joining the work that is currently being done; they are joining in the evangelistic efforts already being carried out locally," says Stephen Sickel, coordinator for partnerships, teams, and projects for Nazarene Global Missions.

From the beginning, it was generally true that the U.S. would send teams to the other regions. However, in the last few years, many other countries have been sending more and more teams all around the world to join God in missions there. In the past year, churches have sent 23 teams from Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, Denmark, Germany, South Korea, Peru, Philippines, Rwanda, Singapore, and Thailand to serve with other congregations seeking to establish stronger work or meet local needs in distant places.

"The name change also was needed due to stricter traveling restrictions," Sickel explains. "If you say that you are going to do work, that changes the type of visa that is required. If you say that you will be witnessing, in some countries that is not allowed."

In addition to the new name, the Nazarene Missions Teams registration process has had significant upgrades. # **Crisis Care Kits**

Nazarene Missions International (NMI) has a legacy of hands-on participation. It was this rich heritage that resulted in the founding of NMI more than 100 years ago.

The passion to be directly involved in missions fostered the partnership between Nazarene Compassionate Ministries (NCM) and NMI, resulting in the ministry of Crisis Care Kits. These kits provide basic necessities to those who are displaced following a disaster. Thousands of Crisis Care Kits are made, stored, and distributed globally each year as needs inevitably arise around the world—such as to support refugees fleeing Ukraine due to the ongoing conflict.



While we often think of providing global help, even in our own backyard across the U.S., families are receiving basic necessities following disasters like hurricanes, tornados and flooding and more.

For example, shipments were made to Maui following the devastating wildfires, and to Tennessee and North Carolina following back-to-back devastating hurricanes in 2024. While we work together as the WAPAC District to contribute Crisis Care Kits, we rarely know where they are distributed. What truly matters is that we are stepping up to meet a need and serve as the hands and feet of Jesus.

# **NMI Facts**

#### **Living God's Mission**

- The Church of the Nazarene ministers in 165 world areas with Belgium on the Eurasia Region recognized in 2024.
- The number of Nazarene churches in 2024 was 30,585, with over 2.78 million members, an increase of 2.11% from last year.
- In 2024, there were 473 districts and 29 pioneer areas around the world, with 31,688 credentialed clergy.\*

#### **Prayer for the Lost**

- We encourage people to pray for all missions efforts of the Church of the Nazarene.

- Since 1996, during the week that includes the first Friday in March, NMI has called the church to prayer through the Global Week of Prayer, with resources for adults and children in multiple languages. www.nazarene.org/NMIGWP

#### **Giving to World Evangelism Fund**

- We inform our churches of the world's need and how the Church of the Nazarene is responding through the World Evangelism Fund. We encourage every church to faithfully participate in giving to the World Evangelism Fund.
- 50 educational institutions, including seven graduate seminaries/theological colleges, 14 liberal arts colleges/universities (13 with graduate programs), 18 undergraduate seminaries/theological colleges, eight certificate and diploma Bible colleges, two nurses training colleges, one teacher training college, and 1.023 education centers (approved extension centers) in 110 world areas had a 2023-2024 combined enrollment of 43,476 students globally.\*
- Persons in need were treated at community-based clinics and health care centers all over the world with concentrated efforts in India, Papua New Guinea, and Eswatini (formerly known as Swaziland).\*
- JESUS Film Harvest Partners (JFHP), raising \$4.8 million, reports that World Evangelism Fund (WEF) helped provide infrastructure for 1,166 JFHP teams to share God's love through the story of Jesus. In 2024, teams reported over 2.3 million evangelistic contacts. Of these contacts, 688,936 indicated decisions for Christ with 394,969 new believers receiving initial discipleship follow-up. Teams started 12,866 Preaching Points in 2024.

- NMI and others partnered with local churches to help raise US \$38.5 million through the World Evangelism Fund during the 2023-2024 fiscal year.\*
- Churches globally gave US \$25.6 million for Nazarene Approved Missions Projects.\*\*
- In 2024, 109 districts gave 5.5 percent or above of their income to the World Evangelism Fund (63 of which were from regions other than the USA/Canada Region). WEF giving beyond 5.5 percent helps open new work, sustains works opened in recent years, and helps send new missionaries that God calls.<sup>1</sup>
- Nazarenes gave US \$217,550 to World Mission Broadcast (WMB), providing radio, television, and Internet programs to share the gospel globally.\*\*
- NMI partnered with Nazarene Compassionate Ministries to give more than US \$7.5 million for disaster response and compassion projects around the world and to support 10,000 children through Child Development Centers and Pastor's Kids programs.\*\*

#### **Giving to Alabaster**

- Churches lay the foundation through Alabaster offerings for places where people worship, heal, and learn by encouraging global participation each year. Every Alabaster project is a joint effort of local contribution and labor, combined with global love and support in bringing tangible presence and a sense of long-term commitment to a community. No Alabaster funds are used for administrative costs.
- Nazarenes gave US \$2.8 million for Alabaster to fund projects in 2024. The Alabaster Offering is used in all six global regions.\*\*
- Often, Alabaster giving goes hand in hand with Nazarene Missions Teams who help build structures funded by Alabaster and the contributions of Nazarene Missions Teams. NMI assisted 355 Nazarene Missions Teams comprising 4,664 participants for projects.

#### **Engaging Children and Youth**

- We engage children and youth in learning about and participating in the mission of God. We collaborate with NDI and NYI to ensure that all children and youth have a spirit of missions within them.
- NMI provides Kids Kaleidoscope as part of NMI Central to help nurture a spirit of missions in children. Kids Kaleidoscope connects to the focus story in NMI Central the first Wednesday of each month. www.nazarene.org/nmi-central
- International Student Scholarship Fund (NMI 80th Anniversary project) provided 85 scholarships for students outside the USA/Canada to attend Nazarene theological institutions.

#### **Providing Care and Connection to Nazarene Missionaries**

- NMI provides care and connection between missionaries and local Churches of the Nazarene.
- All six regions participate in providing Care and Connection between districts and Nazarene missionaries through LINKS.
- In 2024, there were 466 missionaries originating from 60 world areas, serving in 81 countries. Of these missionaries, 339 served as global deployed and 127 were sponsored deployed. Last year, there were 38 new missionary deployments. Within these missionary families, there are 317 missionary kids.
- Nazarenes gave US \$4.2 million in deputation and missionary support offerings for missionaries.\*\*
- Missionary Health Care provided US \$336,275 in medical assistance for Nazarene missionaries, through offerings, Memorial Roll gifts, and Distinguished Service Award gifts.\*\*
- 364 retired missionaries received benefits through the Global Missions Pension Plan for the 2023-2024 fiscal year.\*
